NYBG's Incorporating Purpose vs. Current Purpose

NYBG was envisioned to be for "the advancement of botanical science and knowledge and the prosecution of original researches therein and in kindred subjects, <u>for affording instruction</u> in the same ... and <u>for the entertainment, recreation and instruction</u>" of <u>New Yorkers</u> and <u>not</u> to act as a "wide-ranging research ... International Plant Science Center</u>." Though NYBG's incorporating purpose broadened to act beyond New York's five boroughs in 1933, international travel was far from ubiquitous. Further, its education purpose – available to New Yorkers - deepened, when NYBG was mandated to become an "education institution" [see Incorporating v. Current Purpose chart below].

In addition to NYBG's antics to remove New York State control of its admission provisions [to the detriment of New Yorkers], NYBG's current purpose makes clear that New York City's Office of the Mayor must have controlling laws and contracts codified so that the City's oversight agencies can ensure that the policies and practices that NYBG and the other PEC institutions put in place are compliant [see <u>PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP</u>, <u>PARK</u> INSTITUTIONS and LAWS.]

" for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a botanical garden [and], museum [and], arboretum, <i>library and education institution</i> therein and elsewhere within or without the state of New York," <u>EXPLANATION</u> – Matter in <i>italics</i> is new; matter in brackets [] is old law to be omitted. [emphasis in original]
